- There is opportunity for improvement even when an occurrence doesn't result in an accident.
- Each time a no-injury accident occurs, we are offered the chance to study it and rectify the problem before it results in a lost-time accident.

#### And accident prevention saves money and lives

Even in instances where nobody is injured, it's important to prevent future occurrences because accidents can cause:

- An increase in production costs
- Personal injury

# Investigate even accidents – even those where no injuries are involved

#### Investigate all accidents
